David Ragan

Driver of the Roush Fenway Racing No. 6 AAA Ford Fusion

David Ragan is wrapping up his rookie season as the driver of the No. 6 AAA Ford Fusion for Roush Fenway Racing in the Nextel Cup Series. He enters the Ford Championship Weekend second in the Raybestos Rookie of Year standings in the Nextel Cup Series and leading the Rookie standings in the Busch Series.



After successfully competing in the Discovery Channel's *Roush Racing: Driver X* series in 2005, Ragan was selected as co-driver of the No. 6 Roush Fenway Racing Ford F-150 by Mark Martin. He garnered seven Top-10 finishes out of 16 races run in the Craftsman Truck series. He also competed in a select number of Busch and Cup Series events.

Ragan began racing at age 11 in the Bandolero Series under the guidance of his father, former Winston Cup driver and AAA tow truck operator Ken Ragan. He won two national championships in Bandolero Series.

Ragan partnered with Dash Series driver Cam Strader and went to work in his shop. Strader taught him what it took to set the cars up, and allowed Ragan the hands-on experience to which he credits much of his success. Much more than just a driver, Ragan worked countless hours preparing the cars that Strader would race to the 2001 series Championship.

Ragan ran several late model races across the southeast in 2002. He began his relationship with Mark Martin, driving for him in the Legends Pro-Division, finishing fourth in series points out of more than 60 drivers. As soon as he turned 18, Ragan made his first foray into NASCAR, running select Craftsman Truck and Busch Series events, along with a limited ARCA schedule. He started second in his first ARCA start.



Charles Meyer, P.E.

Fellow to the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO)

Charles Meyer is a Professional Engineer in his sixth year as a Traffic Operations Engineer with the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) and currently on assignment as Fellow to the American Association of State Highway Transportation Officials (AASHTO).

In May 2007, he was selected as the nation's Fellow to AASHTO, a Washington, D.C. association that represents the transportation departments of all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico in all facets of transportation. There Meyer serves as the liaison to the Systems Operation Subcommittee, one of the many committees of AASHTO. In that capacity, he serves as liaison to the National Traffic Incident Management Coalition (NTIMC), a team of public safety and transportation partners dedicated to responder safety and highway system operation.

A native of Iowa, Meyer is a graduate of the Coast Guard Academy. He joined CDOT in 1998 and later became one of the youngest regional engineers in the state. He has worked as the Regional Traffic Operations Engineer since 2002, where he conducts traffic engineering, system operations, maintenance supervision, incident management planning, and business operations for the northwest quarter of Colorado.





Major Charles Andrews

Major Charles Andrews currently serves as chief of the Service Division of the Alabama Department of Public Safety and is a member of the International Association of Chiefs of Police Highway Safety Committee.

Prior to his current assignment, he served as legislative liaison and special assistant to the director. He has served as an Alabama State Trooper for 26 years and has 29 years of law enforcement experience.

Major Andrews was appointed Assistant Director, with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in October 1999.
